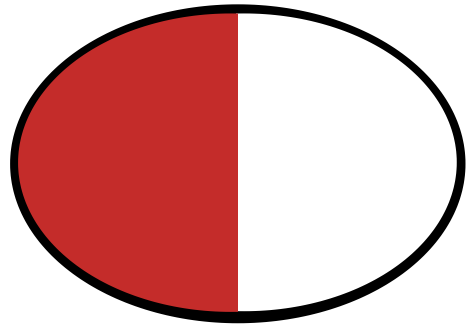
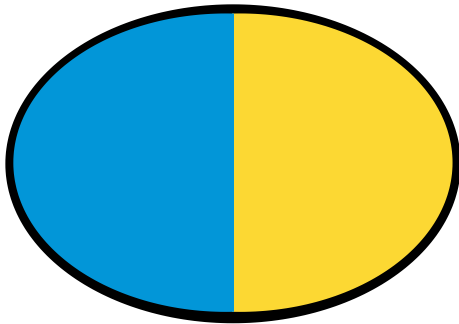

FIRST GRADE - JEREMY ROWE

To The MCUE Faithful, Having returned to the top of the ladder, we went to Maher Oval to play Turvey Park in a clash between 1st and 6th. The Bulldogs had been struggling and after getting some external help in regaining top spot it was now up to us to protect that position. We had put in a terrific week on the track and the scene seemed set for us to stick our flag in the ground and send a message that we were about to click back in to gear when it mattered for the run into the finals series – unfortunately the reality was far from the intention and what followed was the most disappointing afternoon of footy for the 2021 season. We bounced out of the blocks in decent fashion and whilst it was clear that Turvey had come to play we also looked sharp in the early stages and our defensive intent and our ball use was strong. We must now avoid being in denial and acknowledge the fact that it has been a long time since we strung together 4 quarters of our best footy. For reasons that I can't explain, we have got away from what made us look unbeatable at the start of the season and we have started to invent methods and introduce behaviors to our game that will hamstring us from prospering and prevent us from playing to the level we know we can. Whilst the GGGM loss stung, I had a concerning feeling that we were too quick to justify the loss and treated it as if it was all part of the journey. On this occasion, I can say that in my time in coaching I have not seen a group more disappointed or embarrassed after a game and I do think that this low point can be the catalyst for us to move forward in a positive fashion. We have reviewed the game and the message has been delivered bluntly that we need to stamp out the things that are holding us back and welcome back the great things that we all loved seeing and watching at the start of the season. This is the same group that went 11-0 and this is the same group that made us all stand and cheer early in the season – all we need is to see this group return to playing like itself, like 'us' and we will see the results come with it. Jacob Whitley was 6th best and on a day where we struggled to compete in the contested ball realm, Whits certainly cracked in and tried his best to save a sinking ship. George Kendall didn't hit the score board but he presented all day and took some strong marks for 5th best whilst our co-captain Nick Collins buried himself trying to lead our group to a better place during the course of the day. Funnily enough, the top 3 players found their way in to this position on the back of effort. On a day where our group seemed to show a willingness to be defeated, Jake Hindmarsh, Brayden Ambler and Ryan Turnbull all showed the actions of men that had an unwillingness to be beat and sadly too much was left to too few. Jake ran hard all day, covering ground, taking yardage and surging the ball forward while Brayden's attack on the footy and general vigor led to 2 goals and his fair share of stoppage wins. Finally, we certainly saw Rabs back to his best form and his efforts on the spread were inspiring during the course of the day. The game has been dealt with, harsh words have been spoken, soul searching has taken place, education has occurred and now optimism returns! We move forward with the expectation, not the hope, that we can return to being the best team within this competition. We are determined to regain momentum over the next 2 weeks and hit the finals series with confidence and a brand of footy that will make us a force to be reckoned with and will have our supporters standing and cheering once again. MANGO-'GULLIE RIVALRY AGES OLD

The first time Mangoplah-Cookardina United won a hat-trick of premierships as a combined club followed an absorbing and bruising grand final draw and replay against old rival Collingullie way back in 1967. We host our long-time foes today in what should be a great day of football and netball. Memories of those stirring contests 54 years ago are still vivid in the minds of those who played in them. Competition between the two clubs' first grade football teams has always been intense and it will be no different this afternoon, with both sides looking for good form to take into the approaching finals. MCU was a foundation club of the Farrer League in 1957 and had already won the inaugural pennant and been a powerhouse of the competition by the time Collingullie joined the league in 1965, having won the 1964 Central Riverina League premiership, beating Junee in the grand final. 'Gullie wasted no time settling in, making it to the '65 preliminary final before MCU, guided by former Richmond player Frank Slater, came from behind to win, backing up the following Saturday to thrash Wagga by 41 points in the grand final. That Goannas' side had plenty of firepower ... just consider this for a leadership group: Slater, 30, as captain-coach, 28-year-old Martin Bourke (ex-Geelong) as his assistant and up-and-coming rover Colin Roberson, 20, as vice-captain. In 1966, MCU (being led for the first time by Arthur Cole)

and Collingullie, then known as the Redlegs, played off for the title, with the Blue and Golds winning 8.9 (57) to 4.18 (42) at Yerong Creek. In 1967 the teams met five times and five thrillers ensued. MCU won at Collingullie on 6 May by two points and then the same result occurred at Mangoplah on 15 July. Collingullie, led by Noel Morrow, won the second semi-final at Yerong Creek by eight points and then the 16 September grand final at the same venue was a nail-biting 13.13 (91)-all draw. Coincidentally, the women's basketball grand final was also a draw (29 each), with 10 minutes of extra time needed for Henty to down Lockhart 33-32. So it came down to a replay to determine the 1967 football premier and another mighty struggle took place. MCU led at every change and in the end there was only a goal in it – the Goannas victorious 8.11 (59) to 7.11 (53). Veteran half forward flanker Horace Clarke, 42, was named MCU's best, with John Ross's ruckwork, full forward Rex Burge's four goals to give him 107 for the season and David Maher's marking also prominent factors. Gate receipts for the grand final and replay were \$3281, with admission 50 cents! The Crier programme cost 5c. The Goannas and Collingullie played off again for the premiership in 1969 and this time the Demons (they'd adopted that tag in 1968) getting up by 15 points. In 1974, Collingullie and MCU played another epic grand final draw (117 apiece) before the Red and Whites prevailed by 13 points in the replay.

Since then, these two proud villages/districts have met to decide grand finals in 1982, 1984, **1985**, **1988**, 2014 and 2015, with MCU's premierships marked in **bold**. There is never any love lost when these two clash, but there is also great admiration and respect for each other and today won't be any different.

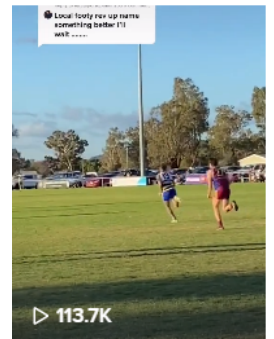
